

Settling back into the new normal...

In September, we have focused on ensuring everyone feels safe and settled back into school, reconnecting with the routines of learning and how to learn.

We will continue to focus on the recovery of learning and expanding the children's curriculum. This will help develop the pupil's creativity, support a healthy mind and healthy body and we will also develop aspects of connected learning.

Promoting Positive Behaviour Assembly was held on Friday 14th October. It is important that every child is a good role model in school. There have been a few issues raised by staff members regarding aspects of pupil behaviour, which were addressed at the assembly.

As a school community, I would ask for parental support in developing the following areas of learning and positive behaviour which build into our 'Learning to Learn' wall. We are developing the following aspects of school life to support the children as learners

1. Develop Resilience.
2. Become More resourceful.
3. Be Focused on their learning.
4. Be able to learn from what others do and say.
5. Be a good role model.
6. Be respectful of others and the property Of others and that of the school
7. Take ownership and responsibility of their own things. e.g., Jumpers!!!
8. Be a good listener in class.

Impact of Industrial Action by Teaching Unions (Action Short of Strike/ASOS)

As you may be aware the Teaching Unions have balloted their members and have voted for action short of a strike. These actions are focused on aspects administrative duties, not undertaking additional duties and attendance at meetings. There will be no impact on teaching & learning.

P1-P6 Baseline Assessment Meetings: In normal circumstances, the staff would organise a baseline Parent Teacher meeting and discuss the outcomes of the GL Standardised Assessments from May 2022 and map out the strengths and areas for improvement of each pupil.

These meetings will not take place as result of ASOS. This will enable a full PTM to take place in Term 2.

FSM funding



School Building Renovations

The EA Maintenance teams and contractors completed the planned classroom renovation projects in P4 and P4/5. They completed the re-flooring projects in P2/3, P4, P4/5, P5 and P6/7 and the corridors at the rear of school. The re-roofing project was also completed. The P4 and P4/5 classroom are now bright and encouraging learning environment. The corridors are safe and tidy. The roofing has secured the premises from further water damage.

There are a few additional pieces of work to complete a full renovation of the entire school, including new window blinds and cupboards in P6 MS, P5 TO and P6/7 CMcK.

I would like to acknowledge the contribution of the Parents' Association in supporting the renovation project by providing additional funding.

- SCHOOL GROUNDS-

Outdoor learning space is making progress with the additional fencing and the provision of the Poly tunnel. We are waiting on the delivery of a Shed for storing all our fantastic outdoor learning equipment.


Gaelic Games

Communication Strategy

Communication Statement:

Open and effective communication is vital to the health and wellbeing of the School community. Effective communication encompasses the exchange of ideas, where people feel they have been heard and their opinions valued, and where information is clear and accurate. All communication needs to be timely, relevant, accurate, well targeted, well delivered, clear and concise, open honest and frank, reciprocal and interactive.

This statement outlines how the implementation of communication strategies enhances the quality of School community through:

- Providing a framework for effective communication;
 - Promoting understanding and co-operative teamwork between the school, parents/ guardians and pupils.
 - Promoting active participation of the whole school community in effective communication
 - Contributing to the best learning outcomes for pupils
 - Ensuring principles of effective communication are displayed by staff in their work in the school
 - Collective understanding that parents/guardians, pupils and staff have a common goal.

Aims

1. To improve the quality of service given to pupils, parents, families and community by ensuring that effective communication and consultation takes place between the school, parents, pupils and other stakeholders.
2. To improve the quality of service by ensuring robust processes for consultation between the school, parents and pupils on key service areas.
3. To be effective, communication between staff and parents remains polite and professional.

Communication Tools

School Communicating with Parents & Stakeholders

- (a) Teacher to Parent - this will normally be via the SEE- SAW App
- (b) School Principal to Parents - will normally be via email or NI School app/ School website
- (c) Emergency or Short Notice announcements will be via the Teacher 2 parent Text Service e.g Emergency school closure, after school club

cancelled due to absence. All parents/guardians are asked to keep the school up to date with any changes to a mobile or email address.

(d) Provision of all school policies are the school website and email.

Written copies available on request. P1 parents will receive a copy of the school's child protection policy.

(e) SEN documents e.g Pre- Code and IEPS will be issued via email, parents will need to verify that the document has been received. Parents are welcome to arrange a meeting with the class teacher to discuss.

Parents Communicating with Staff

(a) Learning & Curriculum issues - e.g. forgot a homework should be addressed by

- Our aim will always be to return a telephone call to a parent within 24 hours.
- Return calls may be made by someone other than the person to whom the original call was made, should it be felt that this is more appropriate.

(b) Safeguarding - please ask to speak directly to Mr Sherlock, our Safeguarding Designated Teacher. In his absence, Mrs Tunney will offer advice as his deputy.

Please check the school website for all safeguarding procedures.

(e) Alternatively, a note to the class teacher can suffice.

Key Points

1 The initial point of contact should be with the class teacher.

2 At initial point of contact can you give a brief outline of what your query is about so that it can be dealt with efficiently and effectively.

3. Effective telephone communication can be a problem in school, where teachers are teaching full-time or taking after school clubs.

Parents may be disappointed or frustrated if they feel that a message does not receive an immediate reply, when in fact there has been no available opportunity for the member of staff to reach a telephone or return a call. Be assured, a member of staff will deal with your request as soon as possible.

See-Saw Communication Tool

As a consequence of the Covid pandemic, school closures and remote learning experiences, the school staff availed of and used the SEE- SAW app to communicate directly with Parents.

As we return to normal schooling, the teaching staff will continue to use the SEE- SAW but in a reduced capacity, staff will continue to send out information regarding their class, class activities, samples of class work. This will be a one-way flow of information (Teacher to Parent only). This is to encourage the more established interactions between staff and parents, via face to face meetings and phone calls to the office.
